Visit to Earth Saviours Foundation

On 29th January 2017, Members from IASAP's Delhi Chapter visited the 'Earth Saviours Foundation' which is located at Bandhwari Village, in Gurgaon and run by Mr. Ravi Kalra, Founder and President.

Bandhwari is situated on the outskirts of Gurgaon city, where there is no noise pollution and the surrounding rocks make the Gurukul a quiet place with scenic beauty. We were overwhelmed by the plight of 350 abandoned senior citizens, including some mentally disabled people. Our conversation with a few inmates revealed stories of hurt, horror and pain, which moved our hearts and left us wondering at the cruelty and heartlessness of the world.



The inmates belong to different parts of the country. They are housed in three big halls

which are only temporary structures. They are each allotted a bed where they keep personal belongings along with pictures of their Gods, who are the only source of strength for them other than the benevolence of Mr. Kalra.

Mr. Kalra and team informed us that there is an urgent need of food, clothes and other day to day items to run the shelter smoothly. His major priority now is to cover the barracks with double layered iron insulated foils and plastic fiber sheets to insulate the inmates from the extreme climate as the present living condition makes life hell for them during freezing winters, rainy days and in summer. For this, the NGO had requested IASAP to donate in cash to enable them to arrange for these necessities.

We are convinced that these shelters cannot run only with good intentions but also need a helping hand from all regardless of how much they can contribute. Those who cannot contribute monetarily or in material can simply go there, sit and talk with these people, who are deprived of any social contacts and are starved for love and compassion from fellow humans.

At a personal level, there is a message here that one should get proper education for awareness; to keep check on one's wealth and to never take good health for granted, and most importantly, be self-reliant - love your children to the fullest but do not expect too much from them in return.

Mr. Kalra and team took very good care of us, giving detailed information on the organization. They offered us food, tea, *prasad*, a Memento and framed pictures of Gods from every religion.

We were able to collect a humble amount as donations from a few members who readily contributed cash, but it was not even remotely close to the amount required to refurbish the shelter. Some members also contributed clothes and food. We left with moist eyes and with a pledge that we will try to help as much as we can,



by informing all IASAP members to come forward for help and keep visiting this place regularly.

We hope that more members will come forward to contribute and assist Mr. Kalra in his efforts to provide succor to these people in dire need.



As Vandana succinctly summed it up, "Organizing a Charity event once a year under the aegis of IASAP is only an effort to remind us that we must give back to society in whatever way we can. Whether we support an orphanage or donate clothes to Goonj or give support in cash and kind to Earth Saviours Foundation, it is only an attempt to draw our attention to the widespread pain, suffering and misery in our society and how we can help them even if our effort is only a drop in the ocean of goodness".



ORIGINS OF SOME COMMON PHRASES

- 1. Why ships and aircrafts use **Mayday as their call for help**... This comes from the French word "m'aidez"...meaning "help me" and is pronounced approximately as 'mayday'.
- 2. Why a score of **zero** in **tennis** is **called** "love"... In France (where tennis originated in the 12th Century as a hand-ball game), the round zero on the scoreboard resembled an egg and was called "*l'oeuf*", which is French for 'egg'. When tennis was introduced in the US, Americans (naturally) mispronounced it "*Love*" and then the word stuck on.
- 3. Why people **clink their glasses before drinking a toast...** In earlier times it was common for someone to kill an enemy by offering him a poisoned drink. To prove to the guest that a drink was safe, it became customary for a guest to pour a small amount of his drink into the glass of the host. Both would then drink it simultaneously. When a guest trusted his host, he would only touch or clink the host's glass with his own.
- 4. Why shifting responsibility to someone else is called "passing the buck"... In poker, a card game, it was customary to pass a knife with a handle made of buck-horn from player to player to indicate whose turn it was to deal. If a player did not wish to assume the responsibility of dealing, he would 'pass the buck' to the next player.
- 5. Why people in public eye are said to be "in the limelight"... Burning a piece of lime produced a brilliant light (lime-light) and was first used in lighthouses to guide ships. It was widely used in the 19th century theatres to illuminate the stage, and a performer 'in the limelight' was always the centre of attraction.
- 6. Why **someone who is feeling great is on 'Cloud Nine'...** Clouds are numbered according to the altitudes they attain with nine being the cloud at the highest level. If someone is said to be on 'cloud nine', that person is floating well above worldly cares and is in a state of perfect happiness.
- 7. Why many coin collection jars are shaped like pigs... Long ago, dishes and cookware in Europe were made of dense and inexpensive orange clay called Pygg. When people saved coins in jars made of this clay, the jars became known as Pygg banks. An English potter misunderstood the word; he made a container that resembled a pig which appealed to his customers and delighted the children and thereafter it caught on.



MY VISIT TO KOLKATA ~ by Rashmi Budhraja

Kolkata (formerly Calcutta) is the capital of West Bengal, a state on the eastern border of India. Founded as an East India Company trading post, it was India's capital under the British Raj from 1773–1911. Today it's known for its grand colonial architecture, art galleries and cultural festivals. It's also home to Mother House, headquarters of the Missionaries of Charity, founded by Mother Teresa, whose tomb is on site.

Our accommodation during the trip was located in the outskirts of the city. Staying outside the hustle bustle of the city of Joy added to the holiday feeling. We were close enough to the Sundarbans, which is a natural region comprising southern Bangladesh and a part of West Bengal. It is the largest single block of tidal halophytic mangrove forest in the world. We were lucky to glimpse our first tiger in the wild when we took a safari through the Sundarbans National Park! Fortunately we had none of the harrowing experiences that the Sundarbans tigers are infamous for! This one glanced at us disdainfully and ambled away!

We also visited the mystical *Vat Vriksh* which is a 200 year old banyan tree that attracts a lot of visitors not only from India, but from all over the world. This is a tree that does NOT grow out of the soil. It grows out of its own branches. The seed alights on the branch, germinates from there and produces hanging roots that invade the soils to grow into a new tree.

Buoyed by the cool December weather, we



experienced the grandeur of the Victoria Memorial, the spiritual experience of the ISKCON temple; the scientific temperament of Birla Science Museum; the Godly journey of Birla Mandir and a full day of scientific adventure at Science City. And of course, our trip could not be complete without visiting the Howrah Bridge, Indian Museum and amazing Botanical gardens. We were lucky to experience the famous tram travel run by the Calcutta Tramways Company (CTC). lt is the currently only operating tram network in India and the oldest operating electric tram in Asia, running since 1902. A far cry from the Delhi Metro, but an enriching experience nevertheless!

We also witnessed the Christmas celebrations



at Park Street which I'd say everyone MUST experience! Apart from the amazing festive decorations which immediately boosted our

spirits to an even higher level, the celebrations included parades; food stalls that served a plethora of mouthwatering local and international cuisine; musical performances, street performances etc. I would like to thank Bemvinda Pereira, Chairperson West Bengal who was regularly in touch with me during the trip and gave me valuable tips for shopping, eating joints, places of scenic beauty and all information I needed to enjoy my trip.

I recommend that everyone should experience Kolkata at least once in a lifetime!!
